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NEXT CELEBRATION AT THE MARC. ST. PATTY'S DAY!

A little history first.... From Time Magazine.

M odern St. Patrick's Day <u>celebrations</u>, at <u>least</u> in the <u>United States</u>, are likely be to

characterized by commercial lucky charms and green beer—all of which has very little to do with the historical figure of the saint. As it turns out, it took centuries for the holiday to accrue the elements that now seem crucial to its celebrations.


The March 17 celebration started in 1631 when the Church established a Feast Day honoring St. Patrick. He had been Patron Saint of Ireland who had died around the fifth century—a

whopping 12 centuries before the modern version of the holiday was first observed. But very little is known about who he actually was, according to Marion Casey, a clinical assistant professor of Irish Studies at New York University (and a regular marcher in the St. Patrick's Day Parade in Manhattan). "We know that he was a Roman citizen, because Britain was Roman then, and then he was enslaved and taken to Ireland, where he either escaped or was released," Casey says. "And then he became a priest and went back to Ireland, where he had a lot of luck converting the Druid culture into Christians." Modern-day celebrations and themes continued to take shape during the rest of the 1700s. In 1762, the first New York City parade took place. It wasn't until 1798, the year of the Irish Rebellion, that the color green became officially associated with the day, Casey says. Up until the rebellion, the color associated with St. Patrick was blue, as it was featured both in the royal court and on ancient Irish flags. But as the British wore red, the Irish chose to wear green, and they sang the song "The Wearing of the Green" during the rebellion, cementing the color's relevance in Irish history. <u>Legend says</u> St. Patrick was actually born Maewyn Succat, but that he changed his name to Patricius (or Patrick), which derives from the Latin term for "father figure," after he became a priest. And that supposed luck of his is the root of all the themed merchandise for modern St. Patrick's Day.

In the summer I went to the lakes in Minnesota to a cottage that

we rented during our summer vacation.

I had some very special times at my neighbors lake cottage on Commorant lake. My neighbor was a boy of my age. We walked along the beach by the sloughs and ponds. There were also ponds that had poly-wogs on. There were marshes and reeds and large cliffs made out of clay and sand that were by the banks if the lake. Once I looked up the cliff for frogs and snakes and knocked a beehive down, then I burned it in the fire.

When I was just a boy I would drive the car sitting on my Dad's lap. I got my driver's license when I was 16 and drove to school in the our family's Skylark. It was penny colored and had a white roof. It also had cool hub caps, white striped tires, and bucket seats. I would park in the south parking lot of South High school.

I played tether ball, volleyball and basketball in phy-ed. I wore brown gym pants and a yellow T-shirt. I took a shower afterwards, there

were lockers at both schools.

I played pinball at the bowler with Bob and some other friends.

I had a friend once that was so sad that I ran around with. I went to parties with them all the time and we would drink and smoke, and there was no end.

One time I got into a lot of trouble when I bought a bag of marijuana in the commons. That day I had a terrible time with my classes and couldn't read the letters in my history book.

I was always in a hurry to get to my classes when the bell rang. I would always have way to much too drink when I would go to special events like prom and homecoming.

I was also on the swim team for a couple of years, I would get so

cold and could hardly wait to take a warm shower.

I would get sea sick from the music that was on the radio in those

days. I would look at all the girls when I was in school. I would play tag and study with my neighbor. I would pull pranks in study hall. My dad called the school once while I was in the office with the principal. He grabbed my arm real hard, then my dad came and got me.

Bruce my friend didn't like me to well, he was always getting me into trouble. I called my mother a week before I left school on the pay phone, I didn't say much.

The place was started when a lady from their church left all her money when she died to the church and requested that it be used to fight alcoholism. Every American over the age of 16 drinks an average of 2.54 gallons of pure alcohol a year. There are non-drinkers, social drinkers, controlled drinkers, and problem drinkers. Mr. Iverson knew of an 11 year old who is an alcoholic. Alcohol kills 300,000 Americans yearly. It fills 1/4 of our hospital beds. Alcohol is to blame for 60-80% of all domestic violence, 65% of all child abuse, 90% of all court cases, 80% of all suicides and divorces, 55% of all fire deaths, 75% of all murders, 40% of all drowning's, and 50% of all skiing accidents. In college alcohol plays a role in 90% of all rapes, 95% of all violence, 80% of vandalism and 40% of all car accidents. Sons of alcoholic fathers are 4 times more likely to become alcoholics than the rest of the population. Signs of an alcoholic are-secret drinking, loss of control, drinking alone, change of character, bender, and delirium tremens.

I walked in and sat down in the first chair that I came to, a wooden chair next to the door, facing towards the back of the room, and on the door side of the table. "You can't sit there, you'll have to move to the chair on the other side of the table that's facing the door." "Why?"

"Dr. Sr. will feel more comfortable."

At least, I could be sure that whatever I had done that day, I had made Dr. Sr. very comfortable. Evidently

making the doctor comfortable was the primary mission of the Portland VA.

Just as evident was the fact that Dr. Sr. was very paranoid. Normally, the interviewer sits facing the door. In this instance Dr. Sr., was concerned about being trapped by a patient and left with no exit on the other side of the

Dr. Sr. was also an egomaniac. The outer chair, next to the door, was solid wood. The inner chair was of wood construction, also. However, on the seat was a large very, very soft cushion. Thus the interviewee would sink way down, and unless he was of Michael Jordan structure, he would be looking up at Dr. Sr. J. Edgar Hoover, and others, have used this same method when talking to someone across from their desks. Charles Manson accomplishes the same by sitting on the back of his chair.

Dr. Sr. taking a leaf from Dr. Jr.'s book, began by raking me over the coals for having had the temerity to go to the bathroom at 5:20, thus missing my bus ticket. Next, he asked me why I had not taken care of my business in Vancouver. I explained that the two Legionnaires handled all of Vancouver VA's nonmedical matters.

He rolled his eyes and said, "That's strange,"

My response to Dr. Sr. was, "It's not strange, it's totally insane." That was the right reply. His look changed

from one of total disbelief, to one of, "Maybe, just maybe, this guy's telling the truth."

He then asked me why I was there. I explained that I needed a phone call to Amtrak stating that everything I had tried to do had fallen through, that I was panicked, being in an area without resources for myself, and knowing no one; that I had a physical diagnosis of cancer, and finally that I had a mental diagnosis of clinical depression, all this in addition to being 62 years old. I was certain that if the doctor explained this to them, they would let me use my excursion ticket on Friday (the next train out), rather than making me wait a month for my

Dr. Sr. then said, "I can't do that, I need a diagnosis." Then he stated, "I know your problem; you need a place to stay for thirty days."

I did not need a place to stay. I needed to be home where I had all kinds of psychological support. If I had to sleep out in a blanket roll in Fargo, where I had tons of resources, that was preferable to a lonely one month stint in the Radisson in Portland, where I knew no one, except for with the one I was speaking to. Possibly he thought that I was angling for a room in the hospital for a few days. The mission in Vancouver was vastly preferable, because I had the freedom to go and come as I chose. Especially since the gut wrenching rejection by the Oregon monastery that morning, I was in need of psychological support. But, I was in no need of a bed. (cont. next month)

SCHIZOPHRENIA

WHO BECOMES SCHIZOPHRENIC?

It can affect anyone, at any age:

Children: True schizophrenia is rare in children. Autism, however, may be related to schizophrenia.

INFANTS AND CHILDREN with an autistic disorder don't speak or relate to other people, but they're not necessarily mentally retarded.

OTHER SIGNS of autism are bizarre actions-

rocking, arm flapping, head banging, etc.

Adolescents: Teenagers experience rapid growth and major changes in their emotions, values, relationships etc. FOR SOME, these changes are accompanied by emergence of schizophrenic symptoms. ACCURATE DIAGNOSIS is extremely difficult due to the instability of the adolescent personality.

Adults: PEOPLE UNDER 25 account for most episodes of schizophrenia. It rarely strikes for the first time in people over 45. MEN are thought to be most susceptible to schizophrenia during their twenties or thirties. WOMEN may be more vulnerable during pregnancy, childbirth, menopause.

CAUSES OF SCHIZOPHRENIA

There is no single cause. Authorities suspect that any of these factors may contribute to it's development.

Inheritance: Because children of parents with schizophrenia are more likely to develop schizophrenia, some investigators suspect faulty genes may be involved.

Biochemical Imbalance: Some people with schizophrenia have abnormal chemicals or levels of chemicals in their bodies, suggesting a defect in body chemistry is involved.

Infectious Disease: Some studies have found indications that a virus like infection may be a contributing factor.

Birth Defects: Certain complications during pregnancy or birth may increase the likelihood of a child becoming schizophrenic.

Other theories focus on nutrition, family environments, and reactions to stress.

Hail To The Chiefs and Miscellaneous Facts:

* George Washington had lost all his teeth by age 57. To maintain his appearance, he used several sets of dentures, one made of ivory and wood, one of cow's teeth, and even one made of lead.

* The father of our country didn't cut down the cherry tree. The story was in invention of a man named Parson Weems. Weems was a historian who chronicled his personal hero, Washington. In the process, Wheems invented several stories to demonstrate Washington's sterling characteristics.

* Thomas Jefferson kept a mockingbird in his presidential office. He allowed the bird to fly freely and trained it to perch on his shoulder. The mockingbird would boldly pluck food from Jefferson's lips. Each night, the pet bird would follow his master to the presidential bedroom.

* James Madison was a slight man. He stood 5'4", and weighed only 100#. He was shy and quiet, with a small, low voice.

* Andrew Jackson carried a bullet in his chest throughout his presidential term. "Old Hickory" fought a duel against a man named Dickinson, in 1806. The bounder had insulted Andrew's wife. SANTA CLAUS COOKIES

1 C. sugar

1/2 C. shortening

2 Tbs. milk

1 tsp. grated lemon peel

1 egg

2 C. flour

1 tsp. baking powder

1/2 tsp. baking soda

1/2 tsp. salt

Mix sugar, shortening, milk, lemon peel, and egg. Stir in flour, baking powder, baking soda, and salt. Heat oven to 400 degrees. Shape dough into 1 1/4" balls. Place about 2" apart on ungreased cookie sheet. Flatten to about 2 1/2 " diameter with the greased bottom of a glass dipped in sugar. Bake until edges are light brown, about 8-10 min. Cool. Spread with a small amount of frosting that is tinted to a very light pink. Press on mini marshmallows for tassel and cap. Sprinkle top third of the cookie with red sugar for a cap. Press 2 mini choc. chips for eyes and a red cinnamon candy for a nose. Sprinkle bottom third with coconut for a beard. Frost and decorate each cookie before going on to the next.

Frosting:

1 1/2 C powdered sugar

1/2 tsp. vanilla

1 1/2 tbs.. water

1 drop of red food coloring.

Stir together. Can double both recipes.

De-stressing the Holiday

For many women, the holidays are the most stressful, exhausting time of the year. Here are some ways to prevent holiday stress:

CHRISTMAS WINDOWS ON THE WORLD taken from Woman's Day 12/22/81

While we're roasting holiday chestnuts over an open fire, people in Wales are busy making taffy. Romanian children carol as they follow a large decorated wooden star dramatically held aloft by their leader.

Around the world Christmas is celebrated in a wide variety of ways. Including some of these charming customs in your own family or community festivities can make this merry season even merrier.

AUSTRIA:

from Austria's picturesque mountain villages come the Christmas Eve "caroling chain." The family living farthest from the church or town hall sets out first, carrying torches and caroling heartily. Along the way family after family joins in, swelling the sound of music to a grand finale of chorale splendor and play-acting on the steps of the church or town hall.

DENMARK: Danes wouldn't be without their risengord (rice pudding) at Christmas Eve supper. It's not only delicious, with its cinnamon topping and dollop of butter in the center, but it has built-in suspense as everyone watches to see who gets the portion with the lucky almond baked inside-that means he or she also wins a small prize. Youngsters have an additional routine: They each set aside some of their pudding for Julenisse, the four-thousand-year-old gnome who metes out good (or bad) fortune in the coming year to the "deserving," and who, with his whimsical lopsided red cap, was part of Danish Christmases long before Juleman (their Santa) came on the scene less than a hundred years ago.

GREECE: Greeks traditionally forgo gifts on Christmas day, saving them instead for distribution on St. Basil's day (January 1), when the special treat is *Vasilopita*, an orange-flavored cake named for that same fourth-century Father of the Orthodox Church). Again a lucky charm or coin wrapped in foil is concealed inside the cake to bring good fortune to whoever gets it.

HOLLAND: Sineteklaas, on his gift-delivering rounds, rides in bishop's attire atop a white horse, accompanied by a little rascal named Black Pete- at least so say Dutch boys and girls, who put out straw for the steed and water for Klaas and Pet, in the hope that their waiting wooden shoes will soon be brimming with wondrous delights. For the older set, there are St. Nicholas parties on St. Nicholas Eve (Dec. 5) with amusing gifts deceptively wrapped and often accompanied by a few lines of home spun verse. Special sweets called letterbankket (cakes or chocolate in the shape of guests' initials) are served at a small feast, which might also include hot punch and boiled chestnuts tenderized with butter and salt.





